

International Seafood Sustainability Foundation (ISSF) – Conservation Measure 2.4 – Supply Chain Transparency

Princes Reporting: October 2021 to September 2022.

As a founding partner of the International Seafood Sustainability Foundation (ISSF), Princes is committed to complying with ISSF’s conservation measures. Within conservation measure 2.4, members are required to report their tuna purchases by ISSF supplier source category and ISSF fishery source category.

The tables below outline Princes’ performance for the period October 2021 to September 2022. Figures reported cover all tuna either processed by Princes or within finished goods from third party suppliers, for all customers, within the time period.

Explanation of terms for ISSF fishery source category:

MSC	Marine Stewardship Council certified fishery
FIP	Fishery Improvement Project
FIP A-C	Comprehensive FIPs that are publicly listed and scoring A, B or C in their initial listing.
FIP D-E	Comprehensive FIPs that are publicly listed and scoring D or E.
MSC assessments	Fisheries that have entered full assessment for MSC certification, but are not in a comprehensive FIP that is publicly listed.
